

Development of the New Comprehensive Spine Center

- When planning began for the new Comprehensive Spine Center at MOI, (2015-2016) MU Health decided the center could not be truly comprehensive unless chiropractic and acupuncture services were included.
- The Chiropractic Department at MOI opened in May 2017.
- In July of 2017 the Joint Commission on Hospital Accreditation issued a statement recommending its members introduce chiropractic and acupuncture into their service lines.

What Constitutes a Chiropractic Case

- The three most common complaints are lower back pain, neck pain, headaches
- PM&R and chiropractic share the same patient population. The two fields just offer different approaches/treatments.
- This is also true for acupuncture
 Acupuncture at MOI does not include complaints for systems other than NMS.

 From 13 YOA and beyond

 - 12 and under go to Peds
 Nation wide the average patient is in their 40s
 - Some chiropractors do treat children under 12, I don't choose to


















•There are other methods for stimulating acupuncture points along the meridians

Referrals for Chiropractic Care

- Generally there are no referrals necessary. Almost all carriers pay for chiropractic care.
- Acupuncture is usually has limited coverage and patients are considered to be cash.
- Medicaid is an exception to referrals. A referring doctor must send a referral to Medicaid through the Medicaid system. Once the referral in in the system and MOI can confirm the referral, the patient can be scheduled.

- Medicare does not require a referral but, they <u>do not</u> cover the initial chiropractic visit/evaluation and do not reimburse for imaging ordered by a chiropractor. It is helpful if chiropractic care is recommended to a patient that they patient has imaging of the spinal areas of complaint that is less than one year old.
- Additionally, while extremity conditions are treated by most chiropractors. Extremity care is not covered by Medicare. Unless the pain is associated with spinal dysfunction (radiculopathy, referred pain)
